

"Remembering Reggie" Paddle and Cookout

Saturday, May 30, 2009

The HCC is sponsoring a Commemorative Lake Monroe Paddle and Cookout on Saturday, May 30th in honor of past Skipper Reggie Baker, which will also serve as the HCC Summer Meeting. We'll paddle the eastern arm of Lake Monroe in the afternoon, followed by a pitch-in cookout in the shelter house FOR ALL, including paddlers, HCC members, and other friends of Team Baker. The Club will provide the Main Dish and condiments, and participants are asked to bring a favorite dish to share as well as your own beverages. The paddling portion of the gathering is open to both canoes and kayaks. [Note: there may be a natural tendency for the canoes and kayaks to split up due to the inherent differences in boat types.] It is anyone's guess what the weather will be. The open water may still be chilly, so bring some extra clothes in a dry bag.

Logistics — We will be launching from the east end of the Cutright Access Area roadway just south of the Hwy 446 causeway on Lake Monroe at 12:30 and paddle for three and a half hours or so, depending on paddlers' interests and ambient conditions. Paddlers should plan on arriving by Noon. For those coming from Indy wishing to caravan, we will meet at the Shell Station at the intersection of County Line Road and SR 37 on the south side of Indianapolis at 11:00 a.m. and convoy to Monroe. **For those attending the cookout only, plan to arrive at the shelter around 4:30 p.m.**

Special Instructions — Do not forget to purchase your 2009 DNR Lake Access Sticker.

The stickers may be purchased at the Customer Service Center in the Indiana Government Center South for \$5.00. Dave Ellis, Membership Chairman, can purchase a DNR Lake sticker for you in advance but if you reserve a sticker you must be prepared to pay because we don't want to get stuck out-of-pocket on the money. Finally, if you don't have a sticker, be sure to bring \$113 to pay your DNR fine.

Camping Option — For those wishing to camp on Saturday evening, please notify Kevin Dogan so that he can assist with arrangements.

Directions to the Cutright Put–in and the Shelter cookout site — From SR37, take the SR46 exit east into Bloomington. Stay on SR46 past the IU Stadium. Turn left at the light at 3rd Ave. at the Bloomington Mall and continue east on SR46 towards Nashville. Turn south on SR446 to Lake Monroe. Immediately after crossing the causeway/bridge, turn left into the Cutright Access Area. Continue to the end of the road back by the marina.

Please RSVP in advance so that we'll know how much meat to purchase. Also, if anyone has a portable gas grill, it will help with the cooking tasks.

Hello HCC! Dan Valleskey

I've found that since being elected Skipper, I am asked all sorts of questions. All of a sudden, I am an expert! I thought it might be fun to share some of these with you. I reserve the right to embellish or alter as I see fit, to increase any possible chance for a chuckle. And if you think you see one of your questions herenope, wasn't your question, someone else asked that one. But we all might be able to learn a little. I'll start with the one asked most often.

- 1. Where can I do an (overnight, week long, all Summer long) paddle trip in Indiana? Short answer. If you really want to- think Wabash. Eel or the White is okay for a day or two. Personally, if I have a week free, I'm heading out-of-state. One person asking that question admitted he had never paddled, but he was sure he could cover 30 to 40 miles a day. He was about to retire. Okay, if you say so. Another fellow wanted to know who to hire to shuttle him when he ends his trip a long way from home, but gosh, he won't know where he will end up, after only a week of paddling.
- 2. Can I use your club's insurance waiver? I want to take a group of kids from a camp out paddling. Short answer. No. Long answer: Hell no.
- 3. Where can I take my Boy Scout troop on an overnight canoe trip?

 Short answer: Monroe Reservoir. Reply question- how many dry bags does your troop own?
- 4. Here is a popular one- *Do I have to be a member to go on a trip? Short answer:* No. *Long answer.* Aw shucks, it is only \$15!
- 5. Hey, why don't we list trips on xxx.com paddle e-list board? —or-Can I list this trip for you on xxx.com paddle list e-board?

Well, if it is an HCC trip, thanks but no thanks. If the sponsor wants to list it in a few different places, he can. It is okay for a sponsor to list a trip with more than one club, if he is prepared for a big turnout. But that is his call to make, not yours. Some of our events need more promoting than others. The Pirate Party last year was a good one to promote far and wide, as is the Indiana Paddlers Rendezvous. Most whitewater trips don't need any outside promotion at all.

On smaller, difficult trips, the sponsor may want to screen paddlers. I can recall one fellow that was having bad dreams about inexperienced people showing up at the put in for his Upper Tellico (Class 3-4) trip with an inadequate boat. (Of course, "someone" did call his answer machine, telling of their intent to paddle that trip in a new Walmart canoe. Even offered to unbolt the winch from his truck to mount on the canoe, in place of having a throw rope. Best prank I've heard of in a long time.) On some trips, we need to keep the ratio of newbies to old timers favorable. Darn near anyone can get down the Hiwassee, as long as there is someone nearby to help rescue if needed. Unfettered outside promotion could wreck havoc for a sponsor trying to balance trip attendees.

One important reason for joining the HCC is to have access to all the great trips we do. If all those trips get promoted on a lot of different boards, paid membership will fall off. We continually walk a line between promoting trips, protecting sponsor's private info, and still making club membership worthwhile, if not actually required. Don't rock our boat too much, okay?

Theresa and Deb have posted elsewhere in this issue about the memorial float for Reggie. I'd like to add my pitch for this event. I am going to do everything I can to cancel a previous commitment. I hope you will also make an effort to join us on May 30 at Lake Monroe. That will be our Summer gathering for 2009.

HCC members will be able to paddle together at Eagle Creek Park on Tuesday evenings this year. Group paddles will start at 6:00pm and meet at the Eagle Creek marina. Paddlers must leave the park by closing time and need to check the sign at the park entrance to see when the park closes. The pass allows HCC members to enter the park as early as 3:00pm if they want to paddle on their own before the group paddle.

The first Tuesday paddle will be on May 5 and the paddles will continue through the end of September (September 29).

In exchange for this privilege, the HCC will provide safety boating for Eagle Creek's Sunset Trip series, and help clean up Eagle Creek's shoreline. Calling HCC Safety Boaters!

The HCC will again supply safety boaters to Eagle Creek Triathlons this summer. The Club receives financial compensation for out provision of boats and boaters. But in order to get the money, we need the volunteers!

Below are the dates for the Eagle Creek events this summer:

All events start at 8:00 am Eastern Daylight Time.

Safety boaters are asked to gather at Eagle Creek by 7:15 am to receive instructions, complimentary race T-shirts and to get boats in the water.

Volunteers will follow waves of swimmers and allow struggling swimmers to hang on to their boats. You would then signal to the motorized safety boat, which would swoop in to collect the exhausted swimmer. Safety boaters are not expected to take swimmers to shore. Total swim distance in this event is 500 meters.

So far, the group has had an overnight trip on Lake Monroe and several day paddles on Geist and Eagle Creek. We are also planning a training session to work on assisted and solo (paddle float) reentry this summer as well as a session on Lake Michigan to practice paddling in *real* waves.

Thatcher Pool Closing

Jordan Ross indicated that Thatcher Pool will be closing for the summer on Saturday, May 23 to have its heating/air conditioning unit replaced. It is anticipated that the repair will take 1-2 month. This will impact our Wednesday pool sessions starting on Wednesday, May 27 until the pool reopened.

While Thatcher is unavailable, the city will allow us to use the Krannert pool starting at 8:30 pm. However, this is less desirable than our current 7-9 pm time window. Jordan will start a Bulletin Board thread to discuss whether people would prefer either to use this later time slot, practice elsewhere, or just wait until the pool reopened to resume pool sessions.

Moving Water Clinic for Canoes and Kayaks — Saturday, May 9, 2009

So far, nine kayakers and canoeists have signed up for this class. There are still several positions open for paddlers so e-mail or call Jim Sprandel as soon as possible.

Clinic Goals: To help beginning and intermediate paddlers learn to safely paddle more challenging Indiana river and streams. This course is open to both kayakers and canoeists (tandem or solo). Garry Hill, Dan Valleskey, and Dave Ellis will teach on-the-water sessions for each boat type.

Target Students: Paddlers with a minimum of three months paddling experience. Students must have their own kayaks or canoes and should feel comfortable paddling on slow rivers or lakes.

Course Description: This clinic will start with a talk but will spend most of the day on the water. During this talk, the instructors will explain river features, moving water dynamics, and then how to use this knowledge while paddling the river. They will also discuss aspects of river/stream trips such as safety considerations and setting up a shuttle.

On the water, students will work on:

- Refining their power and turning strokes.
- Edging their boat to expedite turns and keep from capsizing in moving water.
- "Reading the river" that is, figuring out where to paddle when approaching a fast section.
- Entering/exiting the current and moving across the current. These are boat control moves known as "peel-outs," "eddy turns", and "ferrying"

Equipment needed:

 Closed-cockpit kayak with spray skirt. Note: Each kayaker must bring a spray skirt and must know how to wet exit from their kayak.

or

Tandem or Solo Canoe

- PFD (must be worn)
- Paddle(s), water shoes, water bottle(s), sunscreen, and lunch.
- Appropriate Dress The weather may be warm but dress for cold water since the water will probably be in the 50s. Wear paddle-specific top and pants if you have them. Be sure to carry a spare set of clothing since you will be working with new boat maneuvers so you just might get wet.

Time: Meet at Meeting Place at 9:30 am and finish paddling around 4:30 pm.

Meeting Place: Dairy Queen at the intersection of SR37 and R144 about 9 miles south of I-465.

Put-In: Waverly Public Access White River

Take-Out: Henderson Ford Public Access White River

Course Size: 12 Boats – Students will be accepted on a first come – first served basis.

Course Fee: \$10/student - Please mail your course fee to Jim Sprandel (6505 Dean Road, Indian-

apolis, IN, 46220) prior to the course. Make checks payable to "Hoosier Canoe Club".

Course Enrollment:

When contacting Jim, please be sure to let him know: a) what type of boat you will be using (canoe/kayak, tandem/solo, maker-model, length), b) your paddling experience, and c) how to contact you. The \$10 course fee should be mailed to Jim (6505 Dean Road, Indianapolis, IN, 46220) before the course.

Note: When you enroll be sure to leave contact information since we may need to change the course venue at the last minute due to water conditions.

Flatwater Trips

What to Bring on a Flatwater Trip

- PFD (Personal Floatation Device) with an attached whistle
- Spare paddle, bilge pump or bailing device (small bucket, sponge, etc.)
- Rescue gear: paddle float, throw rope, first aid kit
- Personal medications: Be sure to inform your trip sponsor of medical conditions.
- Sunglasses, sun/bug spray
- Lunch, snacks, drinks (hot or cold) plus water!
- **Cold Weather Protocol:** Change of clothes, gloves, and hat in a dry bag. No cotton clothing. (See "Cool Paddling" in the February 2008 HCC Newsletter)

Sat.-Sun. May 2-3, 2009

I've been hearing what a great time the Friends of Muscatatuck River Society (FOMRS) have on their annual spring paddle weekend, originally called the "Spring Tonic," now renamed as memorials for three early leaders of the Indiana padding community: Wayne Durbin, Dan Shade and Orlo Blomquist. After kicking myself a couple of years for not going, this year I plan to check it out. Experienced HCC paddlers who are up for adventure are encouraged to participate.

The Friends of Muscatatuck paddle two rivers on Saturday, one in the morning and one in the afternoon with lunch in between. The rivers aren't determined until close to the weekend, potentially even that morning depending on water levels. It's a beautiful area of the state with many good streams, some of them challenging, and part of the fun is that you don't know where you'll put in until that day. In the evening, there's a campfire, a pitch-in cookout, a silent auction, and music around the fire. Rumor has it there may be some good fried fish.

On Sunday the Friends of Muscatatuck organize a casual, just-for-fun canoe race starting at noon at the Commons Park in Old Vernon.

First shuttle from campground at 9:30

Return to camp for lunch 12:00 to 12:45

Second shuttle starts approximately 1:00 p.m.

Sat.- Sun., May 16 - 17, 2009

Come for one or two days of beautiful paddling. Bends, rapids, bluffs, canyons, and springs comprise what you'll see along this scenic part of the Blue River.

We plan to camp at the Stage-Stop Campground in O'Bannon State Park (Harrison Crawford State Forest) on Saturday Night. State Park entry fee is \$5 per vehicle and each campsite is \$8. For information on camping facilities, call 812-738-8232.

Saturday night, the main stage will feature rock and bluegrass bands and a rousing finale. The festival also offers food, many gear vendors and a silent auction benefiting WV river conservation.

Trip Report—Summit Lake Trip

Saturday, March 28, 2009

When water conditions were too low on upper Fall Creek, Joel DeLashmit moved the March 28 club trip to Summit Lake. Summit Lake is an 800-acre lake near New Castle, IN—only about 80 minutes from Indianapolis. The lake has 3 islands and over 100 species of birds live in the park. The lake is also "kayaker-friendly" since motor-boats are only allowed to operate at idle speed.

The weather forecast was for rain and thunderstorms in the afternoon and that fortunately didn't materialize until after we had gotten off the water. However, we did enjoy 15+ mph winds after lunch which kicked up 1 foot waves. The winds and waves made paddling interesting but eve-

ryone had spray skirts and handled the chop without any problems.
