### The White River Vision Plan

The White River Vision Plan is a joint effort by several regional development groups to enhance the 58 miles of the White River in Marion and Hamilton counties. The goal of the vision plan is to create an accessible, recreational, and cultural environment that encourages a unique sense of place for the community as a whole. From an HCKC perspective, this project is important and offers many opportunities to improve paddling in the Indianapolis area.

The White River Vision Plan site indicated that it aims to promote:

Access to the White River for residents and visitors

The environmental value and ecological quality of the river corridor, including its water quality and natural habitats

Connection to attractions, arts and entertainment venues, hiking and biking trails, and neighborhoods Cultural heritage experiences along the water

The project has completed Phase 1 (Discovery) of its one-year evaluation process. This is the first of three phases where they reviewed plans previously created for the White River, identified current land ownership along the river, demographics trends, environmental systems and relevant stakeholders. One result of the first phase is that they identified recreation as a primary driver for the project.

There are currently in Phase 2 (Envision) and have held a series of public meetings identifying how the public feels that the plan should be implemented. You can view the slides that they presented during their Phase 2 public outreach meeting at this site.

HCKC members has gone to several of these meetings for the project to share how they felt this project should evolve. In addition, a representative from the plan spoke at the HCKC's Annual Meeting and solicited our ideas.

Discussion within the club has identified the following areas of interest:

Increased safe access points along the White River.

Mitigation of low-head dam risks for this stretch of the river. This may include developing whitewater features at one or more dams as they did in <u>Dayton</u>, <u>Ohio</u> or <u>redesign of dam spillways</u> to reduce the risk of drowning due to hydraulic effects.

Preservation of the natural environment that surrounds the White River.

How one man overcame blindness to become National Geographic's 2015 Adventurer of the Year





Lonnie Bedwell, a former Navy Petty Officer 1st Class, was injured in a hunting accident that took his sight instantly. Thirteen years later through a chapter of Disabled Sports USA, Lonnie became the first-ever visually impaired kayaker to complete the entire 226-mile stretch of Colorado River through the Grand Canyon. Hear the incredible journey that led to Lonnie's passion for adaptive sports -- from climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro to kayaking some of the planet's most challenging whitewater rivers.

### Trip Report - Lake Monroe Overnight, Nov. 3-4, 2018

Fall on Lake Monroe is always special. Due to the odd weather this year, the trees were still in color.

On Saturday, we paddled from Cutright over to the tip of the peninsula in Deam Wilderness where we set up camp. After pitching tents and eating lunch, we explored the North Fork of Salt Creek up to Pine Grove Ramp. Conditions started out almost glassy with the wind building slightly in the afternoon. During the trip, we saw and heard loons which were migrating through and an occasional eagle. A total paddle of slightly over 11 miles.

Four of us camped out overnight and we had a great camp fire since Gil had come out the night before and collected a lot of wood while waiting for us Saturday Morning. The weather was in the 40 and 50s compared with 30s the previous night. A great night topped off by Jiffy Pop.


Sunday Morning, we paddled over to Cutright where we met up with Kevin and then explored the area west of the 446 causeway. We paddled down to Ransburg Boy Scout camp and out to the tip of the Allen's Creek peninsula. By the time we headed back, the wind was gusting up to 15-20 mph and we were pushed back up towards Cutright. A fun paddle with 1' trailing waves to play in. I always feel that west side feels more like "big water" and enjoy being able to paddle there safely without the recreational motor boat traffic.

### **LOCATION OF LOW HEAD DAMS**

MISSION STATEMENT: Initiate the removal of Low Head Dams in Indiana through public education and working directly with and engaging those organizations, clubs, schools, and public officials/legislature that can influence such results. River and water safety education is paramount in accomplishing this goal.

### <u>CURRENT WORKING INFORMATION REGARDING LOW</u> HEAD DAMS IN INDIANA:

Over 150 low head dams in Indiana. (the public is uninformed) Inadequate signage signaling the approaching dam. Little or no information available regarding the location of these dams to unsuspecting paddlers...and the dangers of encountering them.

DNR has designed an interactive app showing location of all known low head dams in Indiana

Many of the LHD are on private property requiring education and diplomatic negotiations with the owners...(maybe, offer incentives)

Many Indiana legislators may be uniformed regarding this issue: educate

Average age of drowning in a low head dam accident is 20.5 years.(youth education is paramount)

24 incidents in Indiana LHDs in 2017: 6 deaths and 18 recovered rescues

#### THE HOOSIER CANOE AND KAYAK CLUB'S GOALS IN THIS PROJECT

Outreach to the paddling and on-water recreational clubs, organizations, liveries, etc, in Indiana by: working independently but cooperatively with the DNR & Silver Jackets.

Developing an interactive platform in order that information on the issues and initiatives can be accessed readily...Currently, we are in communication with the Pelorus Project (Fort Wayne) regarding redevelopment of the Pelorus website, with a name change and enhanced mission...Pelorus has decided to give the club administrative rights and this will happen very soon.


enabling all clubs to link to this site to access materials and information on the project The Over, Under, Gone video in a 10 minute version will be available as a teaching tool for educational
